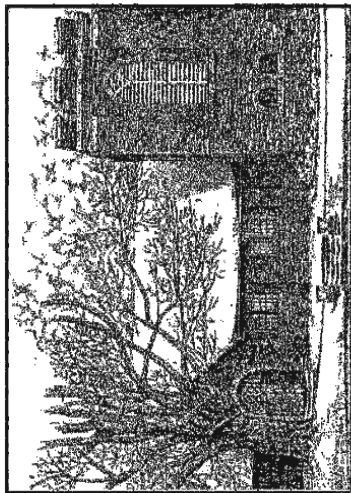

Dear Friends,

Here at the beginning of the year, with wars abroad and economic difficulties at home, it is more important than ever to recommit ourselves to the Lord and to his church. This community is one that stands for the worship of God, following Christ, being open to the Spirit, and serving those in need. We are made up of very different people, but we prize unity. We have strong opinions, but we are more committed to the Lord than to our separate agendas. We even have different visions of God and what God is up to, but we dedicate ourselves to worship the Mystery.

One of the enemies of the spiritual life we enjoy is the devil. Whatever the devil is (and I am not sure what the devil is) it is that presence which seeks to divide us from one another. It is that personality which hates the good we would do and yearns to drive us from one another. It is that malevolent idea, or energy, or demon, or consciousness, or whatever, which delights in humans being distracted, addicted, and shattered.

But the mystery of the demonic is that it also cowers before humility and those who seek refuge in God.

On Christmas Eve the choir sang a marvelous piece which proclaimed, “This little babe so few days old, is come to rifle Satan’s fold.”

Where have we allowed evil a foothold in separating us from one another?

Have we grown proud, cynical, gullible, hard-hearted, or soft-minded?

Have we allowed our devotion to God, our commitment to the church, our search for salvation and holiness to grow slack?

There is one who delights in spiritual malaise.

There is one who savors a pathetic or an apathetic spirit.

There is one who wants our destruction, at our own hands, if possible.

But the Lord Jesus longs for us to recommit ourselves to a vigorous, intelligent, open-hearted, humble, child-like, relationship with the mystery of God. With Jesus, our head and protector, we can overcome the wiles of the devil and grow in service, grow in joy, grow in surrender, grow in praise.

This is a new year. Renounce the places we have compromised ourselves! Recommit to the Lord and Savior of the world! Rejoice in being delivered from evil by Christ our Lord!

AROUND THE PARISH

VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS - NOVEMBER 18, 2008

(Note: These appear after the minutes are approved. Complete minutes are posted in the Parish Hall.)

The Treasurer reported that \$297,876 (81%) has been collected, leaving a 5% deficit. The Vestry passed a motion to defer withdrawal from the Capital Endowment Fund until such time as the Vestry determines it is appropriate.

The Junior Warden reported that the new door is in, and the carpet should be finished by November 19. Extra squares of the same lot number were ordered as back-up for future replacements. Frank also mentioned a concern that there may be water under the foyer, producing mold.

A MUSICAL NOTE WITH ANNA ESCHBACH

How did you become interested in singing? I have been singing and listening to all types of music since the womb. Both my parents are opera connoisseurs, so I guess it's just naturally part of my genes. I started singing in the Orlando Cathedral's youth choir when I was eight; then I joined the Orlando Children's Chorus when I was eleven. As a freshman in high school, I started taking private voice lessons and have been seriously studying ever since. I also played piano, violin and cello as a child.

Where have you studied? My private voice teacher back home in Florida was Priscilla Bagley. I give full credit to her for giving me such a strong foundation in singing. I spent three summers in Geneva, Switzerland studying with a private teacher named Patricia Huber-Brown. While at ASU, I studied with Dr. Joe Amaya, and since graduation, I have been taking from our very own Dr. Jim Bumgardner.

What are your favorite hymns, choir pieces, composers, etc.? My favorite hymn of all time is "Humbly I adore Thee." My favorite choir pieces that St. Mary's has done are the Rachmaninoff *Ave Maria* and the Durufle *Requiem*. As far as opera goes, my favorite composer is Verdi, particularly his *La Traviata* and *Rigoletto*.

How do you describe your range? I consider myself a lyric soprano. On a good day, I can sing a high F above the staff and go as low as an E on the bass clef.

What is special to you about singing with the St. Mary's choir? If I didn't know any better, I would have thought that our choir was completely professional. The talent is simply unparalleled to any other amateur church choir. They have all taken me under their wing since I started in 2004, especially Jim. I am forever grateful to them. Also, the trips to Durham and Cambridge were some of the most fun I've ever had with any group of people. It truly is something special being able to make music with such dear friends in such beautiful and historically rich places.

What are your other interests? My hobbies, other than singing, include hiking, horseback riding, playing tennis, traveling, listening to any and all kinds of



music, eating good food and being in good company. I love to perform, whether it's on stage, at church, or in the shower. But my real passion is teaching private voice. It gives me tremendous satisfaction and fulfillment, even more so than performing. My main focus is classical training for any age or voice type. Environmental Concerns

THE SOUTH PACIFIC AND NORTH CAROLINA WATER SUPPLY

Christmas has come and gone, but the environmental phenomenon El Niño, named after the Christ child, continues to have a global influence. Many of us have heard or read about El Niño in the media, but why is a phenomenon that occurs in the equatorial Pacific important to North Carolinians?

El Niño is a natural occurrence in the Pacific Ocean that affects ocean-atmosphere interactions and causes variable sea surface temperatures. The term "El Niño" comes from South American fishermen, who named the annual Christmas-time warming of the eastern Pacific Ocean after the Christ child. This

ocean warming typically lasts for a couple of months before reverting to cooler temperatures. During more persistent El Niño episodes, ocean warming may last for many months to years. The opposite condition, La Niña, results in cool sea-surface temperatures throughout the eastern Pacific Ocean. The fishermen notice because fish are scarce in the surface water when it is warm but abundant when it is cool.

El Niño and La Niña influence the climate in coastal regions of North and South America, but recent research demonstrates that they also affect the water resources of North Carolina, especially during the winter months. Winter is a key time for water supplies to “recharge” because less water is lost to evaporation and more water is able to replenish groundwater and surface-water supplies. Winter El Niño causes wetter and warmer conditions throughout the state; conversely, winter La Niña causes drier and cooler conditions. Our recent drought, in fact, corresponds with a moderate La Niña event that has

occurred since mid-2007.

While all of North Carolina is at least partially influenced by El Niño and La Niña, the most significant correlations occur along the coast, where an average of 70% more rainfall and up to twice as much groundwater flow occurs during El Niño winters than La Niña winters. Both of these factors affect the water supply for the following summer when tourists and seasonal residents cause the most water demand.

So, next summer when you are at the beach, think about how the water in your tap relates to the success of fishermen thousands of miles away.

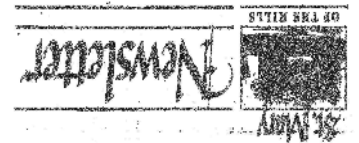
